About this Service

Today is the Feast of Saint Mary the Virgin, Mother of Our Lord Jesus Christ. Traditionally in Western Christianity, this day is known as the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is a principal feast of this parish church, which was organized under the title of Saint Mary the Virgin. The first commemorations on August 15 seem to have been associated with Jesus' conception. (In Jerusalem, Jesus' birth was first celebrated on May 15.) By the end of the fifth century, the commemoration on August 15 had shifted to a rather general celebration of Mary *Theotokos*, that is Mary "the God-bearer," or "Mary, the Mother of God." By the end of the sixth century, however, the feast becomes a more focused commemoration of Mary's *Natale*, or "birthday," which is to say, the day of her death (Latin: *dormitio*, meaning "falling asleep"). Christians have long thought in this way, regarding the day of one's death as one's true "birthday," that is the day of one's birth, through death, to eternal life.

About the Music

The organ Prelude today is the more extended of two organ settings for *Magnificat* on the first psalm-tone by Dieterich Buxtehude (1637–1707). This piece divides clearly into two principal sections, each with four sub-sections and a coda. While bits of the fantasia style are in evidence, most of the sub-sections are clearly in imitative counterpoint. These several sections, taken together, constitute a a grand embellishment of the first psalm tone. It is possible that the several sections of this piece might have been designed to be performed *in alternatim* with verses of *Magnificat* sung to chant between them, however the sections are normally presented as a continuous organ solo without the insertion of chant verses. As is often the case, distinguished historic music lends itself to a variety of reasonable interpretations. What remains is for musicians to find performance solutions appropriate to their occasions and let the hearers delight.

The Italian composer Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (c. 1525–1594) stood on foundations largely laid by the Netherlandish composers Guillaume Dufay (c.

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1397–1474) and Josquin des Prez (c. 1450–1521). Palestrina is credited with setting the canons for renaissance polyphony and the classic standards for Catholic liturgical music which pertain even in our time. Among his hundreds of compositions are over one hundred Masses, most of which were published in thirteen volumes between 1554 and 1601. Palestrina's works also include more than three hundred motets. The Mass setting and the Communion motet today are both by Palestrina. They are intentionally related to one another, being intended for the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary and carrying the incipit Assumpta est Maria. They are both scored for six voices, two sopranos, alto, two tenors, and bass. Many of the musical elements of the Mass movements are derived from the motet and, therefore, it is considered a parody mass. The text of the motet is largely congruent with the texts of the Alleluia before the Gospel and of the proper Offertory for the Feast of the Assumption. The choir will sing the first of the motet's two parts during Communion this evening. — David Hurd


All stand at the signal of the bell. The ministers of the assembly enter, and the Choir sings the appointed Introit.



At the Rood, the Celebrant sings the versicle, and the People respond.





The Lessons

All are seated for the Lessons. The first Lesson, Isaiah 61:10–11, is now read.

I will greatly rejoice in the LORD, my soul shall exult in my God; for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord GOD will cause righteousness and praise to spring forth before all the nations.



The second Lesson, Galatians 4:3–7, is now sung.
