The Patronal Feast

Today is the one-hundred-and-fifty-first anniversary of the first service in the first church home of Saint Mary's on December 8, 1870. That church was at 245 West Forty-fifth Street, just across from what was then called Longacre Square. On December 8, 1895, the first service was held in this our second and present church home. The parish was organized for the then "uptown" neighborhood of Longacre Square, now Times Square, when clergy of the Protestant Episcopal Church were taking the common life of parish churches in a new direction. In the wake of the Oxford Movement in the Church of England, the revival of catholic Christian traditions and practices spread among Anglicans everywhere. In New York, one of the leaders of the movement was the first rector of this parish, the Reverend Thomas McKee Brown. A man of great warmth and a generous spirit, he gave energy and direction to what began to be called Anglo-Catholicism. With the full support of the Right Reverend Horatio Potter, bishop of New York, Saint Mary's was founded, to use Father Brown's words, "for the renewal of congregational worship" on a "thoroughly catholic basis." We are grateful that we can now celebrate this feast and this occasion together once again. We remain thankful on this day especially for the vision and generosity of those who have bequeathed to us such a rich heritage for the work of Christ.

We Welcome Bishop Griswold

The Most Reverend Frank Tracy Griswold served as the twenty-fifth presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church from 1998–2006. Before becoming presiding bishop, Bishop Griswold was Bishop of Chicago (1987–1997) and bishop coadjutor of Chicago (1985–1987). He was ordained to the priesthood in 1963 and served three parishes in the Diocese of Pennsylvania before being elected bishop.

He was educated at Saint Paul's School in Concord, New Hampshire, and earned an A.B. in English literature at Harvard College (1959). He attended the General Theological Seminary and earned his B.A. and M.A. in theology at Oriel College, Oxford University (1962, 1966). He has received honorary degrees from the General Theological Seminary, Seabury-Western Theological Seminary, Nashotah House, Sewanee, the Berkeley Divinity School at Yale, Virginia Theological Seminary, Episcopal Divinity School, Seminary of the Southwest, and Rikkyo University in Tokyo.

Bishop Griswold served as co-chair of the Anglican-Roman Catholic International Commission and on national and international liturgical and ecumenical/interfaith commissions and institutes.

Bishop Griswold continues a ministry of teaching, preaching, writing, lecturing and leading retreats, nationally and internationally, drawing on a broad range of spiritual traditions. He has served as a visiting professor in seminaries and universities in South Korea, Cuba, and Japan, as well as at the Episcopal Divinity School and the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Virginia Theological Seminary, and Seabury-Western. He also serves as Episcopal Visitor to the Society of Saint John the Evangelist.

His books include *Going Home* (Cowley Publications Cloister Book, 2000), *Praying our Days:* A Guide and Companion (Church Publishing Group, 2009), and *Tracking Down the Holy Ghost* (Church Publishing Group, 2017). He describes himself as an inveterate seeker who is both spiritual and religious. Bishop Griswold and his wife, Phoebe Wetzel Griswold, live in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

It is a blessing to be able to welcome Bishop Griswold back to Saint Mary's on this feast day and anniversary. He has been a great friend to Saint Mary's, and we are grateful to him for his kindness, support, teaching, and good counsel.

About the Music at the Mass

The musical setting of the Mass today is the Missa Alma redemptoris mater of Tomás Luís de Victoria (c. 1548–1611). Victoria is considered the most important Spanish composer of Renaissance polyphony. Born in Avila, the seventh of eleven children, he began his musical education as a choirboy at Avila Cathedral, and began his classical education at San Gil, a Jesuit school for boys founded in 1554. By 1565, Victoria had entered the Jesuit Collegio Germanico in Rome, where he was later engaged to teach music and eventually named maestro di cappella. Victoria knew and may have been instructed by Palestrina (1525–1594) who was maestro di cappella of the nearby Seminario Romano at that time. During his years in Rome, Victoria held several positions as singer, organist, and choral master and published many of his compositions. He was ordained priest in 1575 after a three-day diaconate. There are twenty authenticated Mass settings of Victoria, in addition to two Requiems. The Missa Alma redepemtoris mater, published in 1600, is one of Victoria's twelve parody Masses in which he quotes musical ideas from pre-existing musical composition. In this case, Victoria's musical quotes are from his own settings of the Marian antiphon traditionally sung at Compline from the first Sunday of Advent until the feast of the Presentation on February 2. Victoria composed two settings of the antiphon Alma redemptoris Mater, one for five voices and one for eight-voice double choir. His Mass setting by the same name is for eight-voice double choir.

The motet sung during the Communion is a setting of *Ave Maria (Bogoroditsye Dyevo)* by Sergei Rachmaninoff (1873–1943). It is the sixth of fifteen pieces which comprise Rachmaninoff's *All Night Vigil*, Opus 37, a cycle of settings which link Vespers and Matins for the nights preceding great feasts. This cycle was composed in 1916 with text in Russian. However, it was performed in Moscow only a few times before Rachmaninoff relocated to the United States. As early as 1919 portions of this great choral cycle were known to have been performed in New York, sung in English. By 1920 Canon Winfred Douglas, the principal architect of *The Hymnal 1940*, had published a complete English edition of this important Rachmaninoff work. The choir will sing from Canon Douglas's English edition. Rachmaninoff's *Ave Maria*, like its companion Opus 37 pieces, is dramatic and calls for a wide range of dynamic expression. Beginning and ending in a modest four-voice texture, all voice parts subdivide along the way and the choral texture thickens to six voices at its climax.

David Hurd's *Te Deum Laudamus* was commissioned by and is dedicated to Larry King (1932–1990). Dr. King was Director of Music at Trinity Church in the City of New York from 1968 until 1989. He premiered this work at New York's Riverside Church on July 20, 1982. *Te Deum Laudamus* consists of four movements based on verses of the ancient Latin hymn.

The first movement, *The Acknowledgment*, is a *Toccata* based upon the first verse which carries the text:

"We praise thee, O God; we acknowledge thee to be the Lord."

In its outer sections, the plainchant melody is quoted as a *cantus firmus* in the pedal below a chordal toccata pattern played by the hands. Its central section is a short fugue, the subject of which is derived from the chant *cantus firmus*.

The second movement, *The Adoration*, has four distinct sections, one for each constituency which offers praise. Its text is:

"The glorious company of the apostles praise thee.

The goodly fellowship of the prophets praise thee.

The noble army of martyrs praise thee.

The holy Church throughout all the world doth acknowledge thee, the Father, of an infinite majesty, thine adorable, true, and only Son, also the Holy Ghost, the Comforter."

The apostles' praise is set in twelve-tone technique, a reference to the twelve apostles; the prophets' praise employs ascending thirds and fugal imitation suggestive of trumpeting; the martyrs' praise, on the text: "The noble army of martyrs praise thee," expresses the plainchant *cantus firmus* in boldly juxtaposed major triads; the holy Church's praise is a five-voice *fantasia* in which the plainchant *cantus firmus* is fully given out in the upper pedal voice.

The third movement, The Humbling, is based upon the text:

"When thou tookest upon thee to deliver man, thou didst humble thyself to be born of a virgin."

It begins with an extended flute solo. Its central section contains references to the plainchant *cantus firmus*. In its final section, the opening flute solo melody is layered over a secondary *cantus firmus*, the hymn *Divinum mysterium*, "Of the Father's love begotten," and bound together by the harmony of the organ's strings stops.

The final movement, *The Opening of Heaven*, illustrates the text:

"When thou hadst overcome the sharpness of death, thou didst open the kingdom of heaven to all believers. Thou sittest at the right hand of God, in the glory of the Father."

Its subtitle, *Introduction, Fugue and Chaconne*, reveals its musical form. The plainchant melodies of *Dies irae* ("Day of wrath") and *Victimae paschali* ("Christians to the paschal victim")—Latin Sequences respectively representing death and resurrection—are pitted against one another in jagged fugal engagement. After a fierce combat, the chaconne emerges quietly, built on a bass melody which was previously heard in the apostles' praise of the second movement. The chaconne builds its own gradual crescendo through fifteen variations on the bass melody. Finally, the plainchant *cantus firmus* for "Thou sittest at the right hand of God, in the glory of the Father" is stated in the upper pedal voice accompanied by a repeating progression of powerful chords at the movement's conclusion.

About the Organist and Composer

David Hurd has been organist and music director at the Church of Saint Mary the Virgin since spring 2016. He has previously served in several other Manhattan Episcopal parishes, including Trinity, Wall Street; the Church of the Intercession; Saint James, Madison Avenue; All Saints Church; and the Church of the Holy Apostles. He was professor of church music and organist at The General Theological Seminary for nearly four decades. He has also taught at Duke University, Yale University, the Manhattan School of Music, and Westminster Choir College. A graduate of New York's High School of Music and Art, his music studies continued at The Juilliard School, Oberlin College, and the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. His musical accomplishments have been recognized with four honorary doctorates and various other awards, including first prizes both in organ playing and in improvisation from the International Congress of Organists and the 2010 Distinguished Composer Award of the American Guild of Organists. He has composed extensively, particularly in the genres of choral and organ music. His commissioned works have been premiered in such New York venues as Carnegie Hall, Avery Fisher Hall (now David Geffen Hall), Alice Tully Hall, the Cathedral Church of Saint John the Divine, Trinity Church, and Riverside Church, as well as other venues both domestic and abroad. His compositions include over eighty published hymn tunes, several of which appear in major denominational hymnals. O the Depth of Love Divine, a CD including fourteen of his choral anthems, was released by Oregon Catholic Press in 2018. He is represented by Phillip Truckenbrod Concert Artists.

Dr. Hurd offers this performance of his Te Deum laudamus for organ in recognition of the ministry of Father Stephen Gerth as rector of the Church of Saint Mary the Virgin.


The People stand or kneel. Then the Bishop continues





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Neighbors in Need


Saint Mary's outreach program to those in need in the Times Square Neighborhood
