

Ascension Day

In Saint Luke's gospel, which we hear today, Jesus ascends to the Father on the evening of the day of resurrection. In Luke's second book, the Acts of the Apostles, our Lord is described as being present to his disciples for forty days after his resurrection. On the fortieth day he ascended to heaven and took his place at the right hand of the Father. Today the Church celebrates the Ascension of our Lord. It is one of our seven principal feasts.

Solemn Mass is the full traditional form of Christian worship for Sundays and the principal feasts of the Church year. Week by week, festival by festival, the assembly gathers to hear the Word of God, to sing God's praises, to offer thanks for God's gifts, to receive Holy Communion and to be sent forth to love and serve. Easter, the Church's great season, does not end today, but continues for fifty days. Eastertide concludes with Evening Prayer on Pentecost.

The Music at the Mass

The Italian composer Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (c. 1525–1594) stood on foundations largely laid by the Netherlandish composers Guillaume Dufay (c. 1397–1474) and Josquin des Prez (c. 1450–1521). He is responsible for setting the canons for Renaissance polyphony and the standards for Catholic liturgical music which pertain even in our time. Among his hundreds of compositions are over one hundred Masses, most of which were published in thirteen volumes between 1554 and 1601. Palestrina's works also include more than three hundred motets.

The setting of the Mass and the motet this evening are both works of Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (c. 1525–1594), and both spring from a common scriptural inspiration. His motet *Viri Galilaei* was published in Venice in 1591. It is scored for six voices and, in effect, has two movements. The first part, this evening's Communion motet, derives its text from Acts 1:11. (The motet's second part, *Ascendit Deus*, is based upon Psalm 47:5 and Psalm 103:19.) While the Prima and Secunda Pars of Palestrina's motet, taken together, comprise the liturgical Offertory for the Feast of the Ascension, his polyphony makes no specific

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melodic reference to the traditional chant. The motet begins with two voices, then five, summoning the attention of the "men of Galilee" to ask the question, "Why do you stand gazing up?" Palestrina uses the six voices in various combinations, phrase by phrase, maintaining freshness even as the text is repeated. There are some dramatic rising lines in all voices but, curiously, much of the melodic motion in the exuberant concluding alleluias is downward, coming from above. Palestrina's Missa Viri Galilaei takes its musical impetus from the motet. The date of its composition is uncertain, and it was published posthumously in Venice in 1601. Like the motet, the Mass movements employ six voices. The closing section of the Gloria is particularly rich in upward sweeping melodic figures. In the Sanctus, Palestrina reduced the texture to four voices at Pleni sunt coeli, returning to six voices at Hosanna. Likewise, Benedictus is set for four voices with all six voices returning for the closing Hosanna.

Raymond Nagem is Minister of Music at The Brick Presbyterian Church in New York City, and a member of the organ faculty at Manhattan School of Music, where he teaches organ literature, service playing, and improvisation. He completed his D.M.A. at The Juilliard School in 2016, where he was a student of Paul Jacobs.

A native of Medford, Massachusetts, Dr. Nagem attended the Boston Archdiocesan Choir School and began organ lessons there with John Dunn. He earned his B.A. from Yale University in 2009, studying the organ with Thomas Murray, and his M.A. in 2011 from Juilliard.

Prior to his appointment at Brick, he served for eleven years at the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine, where he was Associate Director of Music and Organist. His album *Divine Splendor*, recorded on the Great Organ of Saint John the Divine, is available on the Pro Organo label. At the start of the COVID-19 pandemic in spring of 2020, Dr. Nagem began a weekly online recital series from the cathedral, "Tuesdays at 6," featuring a diverse range of music spanning the entire organ repertoire. In his spare time, he enjoys running, cycling, and crossword puzzles.

The Lessons

All are seated for the Lessons. The first Lesson, Acts 1:1–11, is now read.

In the first book, O The-oph'ilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach, until the day when he was taken up, after he had given commandment through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. To them he presented himself alive after his passion by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days, and speaking of the kingdom of God. And while staying with them he charged them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the promise of the Father, which, he said, "you heard from me, for John baptized with water, but before many days you shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit." So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, will you at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has fixed by his own authority. But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Jude'a and Samaria and to the end of the earth." And when he had said this, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. And while they were gazing into heaven as he went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."




The Congregation remains seated. The Cantor sings the Refrain and the Congregation repeats it. Then the Choir sings the psalm verses to Anglican chant by David Hurd, and the Congregation sings the Refrain.



The second Lesson, Ephesians 1:15–23, is now sung.

For this reason, because I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, I do not cease to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers, that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and of revelation in the knowledge of him, having the eyes of your hearts enlightened, that you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power in us who believe, according to the working of his great might which he accomplished in Christ when he raised him from the dead and made him sit at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in that which is to come; and he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fulness of him who fills all in all.




▼ The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.





The Preparation of the Gifts


The Congregation is seated as the Choir sings the appointed song and the offerings of the assembly are collected.


Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."


