About this Service

This is the Third Sunday after the Epiphany. This period in the Church year is known as the Epiphany season. During these weeks between Christmastide and the beginning of Lent, the Gospel passages at Mass focus on the beginning of Jesus' ministry and how he is revealed to the world as the Christ. This year—the third year in the three-year lectionary cycle—most, though not all, of the Gospel passages are taken from the Gospel according to Luke. The Old Testament lesson and the psalm are chosen because they usually relate in some way to the words and message of Jesus contained in the day's gospel. The New Testament lesson is independent of those readings and is almost always taken from one of the letters in the New Testament that discuss the common life and mission of the first Christian communities.

We Welcome Our Guest Preacher

Our preacher this morning is Father Anthony Jones. Father Anthony is well known to many members of the Saint Mary's community. Upon moving to New York in early 2000, he became a very active member of the parish, serving at the altar as an acolyte in a number of roles. He is remembered for his kindness, his pastoral abilities, his intelligence, his good humor, and his calm temperament. He has stayed in touch with members of the community since he was ordained deacon and later priest. He assisted the Saint Mary's community in a particularly important way in 2014, when he oversaw the pastoral care of a much-loved member of Saint Mary's, Sharon Singh, who died in July 2014. It is a joy to be able to welcome Father Anthony back to Saint Mary's.

A little bit of biography: Father Anthony grew up in Texas and graduated from Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas, and South Texas College of Law in Houston, Texas. He earned a Master of Divinity degree from Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley, California. Father Anthony practiced law in Houston for a number of years before moving to New York, locating an apartment in Bellerose in Eastern Queens, and continuing his career with the Department of Veterans Affairs Regional Office in Manhattan. After serving here at Saint Mary's for more than ten years, he settled in a parish home closer to where he lived in Queens. Saint Thomas's Church, Bellerose, sponsored him for ordination

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to the diaconate. As a deacon in the Diocese of Long Island, he served at Saint John's, Huntington, while then Father Allen Shin was rector there. Under Bishop Lawrence Provenzano, Bishop of Long Island, he was ordained priest on September 14, 2019. Father Anthony serves as assistant priest at Saint Augustine's Episcopal Church in East Flatbush, Brooklyn.

We Welcome Our Guest Organist

Our guest organist this morning is parishioner, Clark Anderson. Clark took his first job as church organist at the age of thirteen and went on to hold a variety of organist and music director positions over the next thirty years, until his day job as a banker forced him to retire from the organ bench. Since then, he has performed and accompanied periodically, and he tells us that he is always happy to be at the Saint Mary's console. Clark has been known to walk over to Saint Mary's to play the organ on a weekday afternoon and often does so on Saturdays. It is always a pleasure to hear him play, and it is great pleasure to have him back to play today. He will be playing two more services this winter, while David Hurd is away. We are very grateful to Clark for helping us to worship in this way.

Clark holds degrees from Princeton University (where he was university organist and assistant conductor) and Pomona College. Clark is currently a managing director at Morgan Stanley here in the city, and he and his husband Zachary have been members of Saint Mary's since 2014.

About the Choral and Organ Music

Today's voluntaries, settings of Gregorian introits for the Epiphany season, were written at almost the same time by two of France's great twentieth-century organists and composers. But they reflect two very different styles. Maurice Duruflé, composer of the prelude, studied with the greats of French music at the Conservatoire de Paris in the 1920s. Olivier Alain, composer of the postlude, also studied at the Conservatoire, but in the 1950s with a different generation of teachers that included Messiaen. This generational change is clearly reflected in today's voluntaries. Duruflé's work, composed in 1961, displays the composer's conservative but distinctive harmonic palette in a flowing, gracious setting. Alain's work, though written in 1959, two years before Duruflé's, is in a decidedly more contemporary idiom. Alain sets the introit around a jagged, dramatic texture in the hands, with the pedal declaiming the chant. The result very effectively captures the text: "Let all the earth adore Thee, O God . . . Shout with joy to God, all the earth . . ." Alain's expert use of modality, atonality, and the organ's more striking colors heightens the drama. One interesting note: Duruflé taught the famous organist Marie-Claire Alain, who was Olivier Alain's sister. — Clark Anderson

The musical setting of the Mass this morning is the five-voice *Missa Prima Sexti Toni* by priest and musician Giovanni Croce (c. 1557–1609). Croce, though overshadowed in historic reflection by certain other Venice-centered composers of the late Renaissance, was well known in his time for his madrigals and secular compositions as well as his extensive

output of church music. Croce sang as a boy chorister under Gioseffo Zarlino (1517–1590) at Saint Mark's, Venice, eventually succeeding Zarlino as *maestro di cappella* there. He remained in that position until his death in 1609, four years before the position went to Claudio Monteverdi (1567–1643). Croce's *Missa Prima Sexti Toni* dates from 1596. It is a bright and succinct setting, embodying the character of its period with economy and grace.

The Communion motet today is a four-voice setting of *O sacrum convivium*, also by Giovanni Croce. The text "O sacrum convivium," often attributed to the theologian, Thomas Aquinas (1225–1274), found a home in the Roman liturgical cycle as the antiphon for Magnificat at second Vespers of Corpus Christi, but is also very much at home in any Eucharistic celebration. It has been set in Latin, as well as in vernacular translations, by distinguished composers of every generation. Croce's setting of "O sacrum convivium" is in a conservative style with graceful falling melodic lines and close imitation between the voices. — *David Hurd*

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

We've learned, not surprisingly, that those we serve, some of whom are unsheltered, some of whom are not, are quite individual, each with different needs. They have become our neighbors. We try to take Saint Benedict's advice and to see Christ in them. It is our hope that they sometimes see Christ in us.
