About the Liturgy

We gather to celebrate the Annunciation of Our Lord Jesus Christ to the Blessed Virgin Mary. This celebration of the conception of Jesus, nine months before December 25, emerged in the Christian East in the fifth century. In Western Christianity, celebrations of the feast began in the seventh century. The Annunciation has remained a feast day among Anglicans since the Reformation. We suspect it has been celebrated at Saint Mary's since our first church opened in 1870.

We could not celebrate the Annunciation this year on March 25, since that was Monday in Holy Week. Therefore, we are keeping the feast on the first available and convenient day after Easter Day and the Easter Octave.

In this parish, March 25, 1892, is the first Annunciation for which we have a newsletter record. Two morning Masses were said, one at 7:30 AM and the other at 8:30 AM. Morning Prayer was at 9:00 AM. High Mass was celebrated at 9:30 AM. Daily Choral Evening Prayer was at 5:00 PM. The newsletter notes that a new group in the parish that had been formed in the past year, the Society of Bona Mors— "whose object is that its members may have a happy death"—would meet that night after Evening Prayer.

As is our custom on Annunciation and on Christmas Day, the congregation is invited to join the ministers of the assembly in kneeling during the singing of the Nicene Creed at the words, "He became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man."

About the Music

The setting of the Mass this evening is *Missa Dixit Maria* by Hans Leo Hassler (1564–1612). Born in Nuremberg and baptized on October 26, 1564, Hassler's musical career bridged the late Renaissance to the early Baroque periods. His initial musical instruction was from his father, Isaak Hassler (c. 1530–1591). Hans Leo left home in 1584 to study in Venice with Andrea Gabrieli (c. 1532–1585) and become a friend and fellow pupil with Gabrieli's nephew Giovanni (c. 1554–1612). Thus, Hassler was one of the first of a succession of German composers to experience in Italy the musical innovations that were shaping what would later be identified as baroque style. Hassler was recognized in his day not only as a composer, but also as an organist and a consultant on organ design. Although he was a Protestant, Hassler's early

compositions were for the Roman church. His *Missa Dixit Maria*, published in 1599, is a parody Mass with themes borrowed from his own motet *Dixit Maria ad Angelum*. The text of that motet upon which this Mass setting is based recounts Mary's words to the angel of the Annunciation, "Behold I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be done to me, according to your word."

The motet sung during the administration of Communion is a setting of *Ave Maria* for five voices by Robert Parsons (c. 1530–1572). Parsons composed sacred music of distinction both in Latin and in English, as well as secular vocal and instrumental consort music. He was appointed to the Chapel Royal in 1567. Little else about Parsons is known with certainty beyond the legacy of his compositions and the fact that he died of drowning in the Trent at a young age, reputedly at the height of his powers. *Ave Maria* is one of the most often prayed—and set to music—of all Christian devotions. Parsons' setting for five voices is harmonically rich and exudes a sublimely serene prayerfulness.

Notes on the Program

Today's program progresses from the exuberant joy of Easter to the reverent devotion of today's Marian feast day and finally the spirited encounter of Pentecost. Simon Preston's *Alleluyas* celebrates the Easter season with a fusion of compositional styles—dramatic and symphonic writing reminiscent of the late French Romantic composers, ethereal poetry following in the footsteps of Olivier Messiaen, and the rhythmic and harmonic flair of jazz. J. S. Bach, Marcel Dupré and Léon Boëllmann offer three distinct tributes to the Virgin Mary. Bach quiets the mind with a solemn and intimate treatment of the *Magnificat* chant, while Dupré creates transcendent stillness with his meditative contemplation of part of the *Magnificat* text. And Boëllmann sings to the

Blessed Mother with a gem of tender lyricism. Closing the program is a three-movement suite honoring Harry Thacker Burleigh, instrumental in bringing widespread attention to African-American spirituals. It was Jessye Norman's recordings of spirituals that revealed their immense spiritual depth to me, and so in the first two movements, I have incorporated gestures that reflect the liberties she took with those spirituals. The suite concludes with a sort of dance, as "Ev'ry Time I Feel the Spirit" is played by the feet on the pedalboard in 7/8 time. – Daniel Ficarri

About the Recitalist

Daniel Ficarri is Associate Director of Music and Organist at the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine, New York City. Named one of the top "20 under 30" organists by The Diapason, Daniel is also a composer of organ, choral, and chamber music. He has made appearances in Carnegie Hall and Alice Tully Hall under the batons of Marin Alsop, Itzhak Perlman, David Robertson, James Gaffigan, and Bernard Labadie; and he has performed in many of the country's great concert halls and houses of worship, including Symphony Hall in Boston and Saint Patrick's Cathedral here in New York. The New York Times featured him in the "Week's 8 Best Classical Music Moments," and WQXR-FM presented him as part of the 2014 Bach Organ Marathon. Daniel studied the organ with Paul Jacobs at The Juilliard School, where he earned his bachelor's and master's degrees. His compositional output includes inaugural organ works for Saint Thomas Church, Fifth Avenue, and Christ Cathedral in Garden Grove, California. Last season, his works received premieres at Juilliard's Paul Recital Hall, The Madison Symphony Orchestra's Overture Hall, and the American Guild of Organists' Westchester Convention. Much of Daniel's music is published by ECS Publishing Group. Daniel studied composition with Rachel Laurin.



Then I said, 'Lo, I have come to do thy will, O God,' as it is written of me in the roll of the book." When he said above, "Thou hast neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), then he added, "Lo, I have come to do thy will." He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. And by that will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.


Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."


